


Thank you, Captain Tom

We were sad to hear of the death of Captain Sir Tom Moore who not only raised £33m for NHS Charities Together but highlighted the work of the NHS charities across the country and inspired many more fundraisers to choose their local NHS charity to support.

Boudicca unit project enters new stage

Our new breast cancer unit is continuing to take shape and now all of the equipment is in place, we can now reveal the artist's impression of the new waiting area and reception for people attending the Boudicca Breast Cancer Clinic.

Detailed consultation has taken place with patients and staff to find out what is needed for the environment and once these areas are

completed, work will begin on the counselling rooms for patients.

Like many charities, the COVID-19 pandemic has severely restricted fundraising in the normal way, so the charity has used existing funds to get the second part of the work on the unit under way. However, we are still actively fundraising to complete the project.

Simon's fundraising walk for hospital charity in exoskeleton suit

Simon Kindleysides, who became the first paralysed man to walk the London Marathon, took part in a new challenge, raising more than **£13,555.91** for our charity.

Simon set himself a goal to walk four miles every day of February wearing a specially-made exoskeleton suit.

The batteries in his suit allow him to travel four miles before they need recharging and each four-mile leg will take him three-and-a-half hours to complete.

He said: "I was sitting at home doing nothing and I just wanted to do something to support the NHS and in particular, the teams at the NNUH, and I walked various four-mile routes through Norwich during the month. This lockdown was driving everyone crazy, mentally and physically so I wanted to push myself again."

Simon was a dancer and a restaurant manager but in 2013 was diagnosed with a brain tumour and functional neurological disorder that left him paralysed from the waist down.

His challenge saw him take 8,000 steps each day and a total of 224,000 across the month. His amazing story was picked up by news outlets across the world, including Israel and Germany where a film crew followed him during a day of walking.

The funds raised will support Critical Care and the new planned children's operating theatre project.

Cashless collection boxes

Our hospitals

Jenny Lind

Building work has started to create a £6.5m dedicated children's theatre complex which will become an integral part of the Jenny Lind Children's Hospital.



The project will be completed in two phases, starting with the creation of a twin paediatric theatre suite, a six-bay recovery unit and other associated works.

The unit will also be fitted out with new clinical equipment to create children's surgical capacity to meet the needs of NNUH younger patients, both now, and well into the future.



Cromer

Work on the North Norfolk Macmillan Cancer Centre continues to progress well and we are planning for a summer opening in 2021.

The building work on the £4.85 million centre will enable patients with cancer to access treatment and support closer to home.

The centre will have six chemotherapy treatment chairs with capacity to treat up to 36 patients a day, three new clinic rooms and two new minor procedure rooms, creating an additional 10,000 outpatient appointments annually and space for new cancer diagnostics, including prostate biopsy.

It will also have a Macmillan cancer information and support centre and will

free up space in the main Cromer Hospital building to deliver an extra 600 surgical procedures in dermatology, urology, vascular surgery and pain management.

We also have some exciting plans to develop the café facilities at Cromer Hospital – we hope to bring you more news on this project later on in the year.

On 3 October 2021, we are holding a circular bike ride from Cromer Hospital exploring the countryside around the North Norfolk coast. The event will be open for all ages and abilities and entries will be open soon.

The Pain Management Service has been based off site since it was established some 25 years ago, firstly at the Old West Norwich, latterly at Norwich Community Hospital and more recently at Adelaide Street.

Katherine told us: "The new furniture has given the whole team a real sense of pride, and... we felt involved in the decision-making process. All surfaces are now unchipped and chairs stain free and are a complete breath of fresh air in challenging times.

"We are really looking forward to welcoming patients back into the clinic once the situation allows."


